Christmas Events



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November 30 Feast Day of St Andrew

On Thursday we celebrated the feast day of St Andrew with Father Damian and St Katherine Church.

The name "Andrew" (meaning 'brave' in Greek), like other Greek names, appears to have been common among the Jews and other Hellenized people since the second or third century B.C.

Andrew the Apostle was born between 5 and 10 AD in Bethsaida, in Galilee. Andrew was the brother of Simon Peter, and likewise, a son of Jonah.

Both he and his brother Peter were fishermen by trade, hence the tradition that Jesus called them to be his disciples by saying that he will make them "fishers of men" ($\dot{\alpha}\lambda\iota\epsilon\tilde{\iota}\varsigma\dot{\alpha}\nu\theta\rho\dot{\omega}\pi\omega\nu$). According to Mark 1:29, at the beginning of Jesus' public life, they occupied the same house at Capernaum.

In the Gospel of Matthew and in the Gospel of Mark Simon Peter and Andrew were both called together to become disciples of Jesus and "fishers of men". Jesus was walking along the shore of the Sea of Galilee, observed Simon and Andrew

fishing, and called them to discipleship. The Orthodox Church honours him with the name *Protokletos*, which means "the first called". Thenceforth, the two brothers were disciples of Christ. On a subsequent occasion, prior to the final call to the apostolate, they were called to a closer companionship, and then they left all things to follow Jesus.

Faith

Subsequently, in the gospels, Andrew is referred to as being present on some important occasions as one of the disciples more closely attached to Jesus. Andrew told Jesus about the boy with the loaves and fishes, and when certain Greeks went to see Jesus, they came to Philip, but Philip then had recourse to Andrew. Andrew was present at the Last Supper. Andrew was one of the four disciples who came to Jesus on the Mount of Olives to ask about the signs of Jesus' return at the "end of the age".

Preaching the gospel

Eusebius in his *Church History* 3.1 (4th century) quoted Origen (c. 185 – c. 253) as saying that Andrew preached in Scythia. The Chronicle of Nestor (1113) adds that he preached along the Black Sea and the Dnieper river as far as Kiev, and from there he travelled to Novgorod. Hence, he became a patron saint of Ukraine, Romania and Russia. According to Hippolytus of Rome, Andrew preached in Thrace, and his presence in Byzantium is mentioned in the apocryphal Acts of Andrew. According to tradition, he founded the see of Byzantium (later Constantinople) in AD 38. This diocese became the seat of the Patriarchate of Constantinople under Anatolius, in 451. Andrew, along with Stachys, the first bishop whom he installed, is recognized as the patron saint of the Patriarchate.

Martyrdom and iconography

Andrew is said to have been martyred by crucifixion at the city of Patras (Patræ) in Achaea, in AD 60. Early texts, such as the Acts of Andrew known to Gregory of Tours (6th century), describe Andrew as bound, not nailed, to a Latin cross of the kind on which Jesus is said to have been crucified; yet a tradition developed that Andrew had been crucified on a cross of the form called *crux decussata* (X-shaped cross, or "saltire"), now commonly known as a "Saint Andrew's Cross" — supposedly at his own request, as he deemed himself unworthy to be crucified on the same type of cross as Jesus had been. The iconography of the martyrdom of Andrew — showing him bound to an X-shaped cross — does not appear to have been standardized, however, until the later Middle Ages.
