Last Friday, Your Year 7 students enjoyed a wonderful Humanities trip to Mountfitchet Castle. The visit brought their studies of the medieval period to life in the most engaging and hands-on way. The students explored the reconstructed Norman motte-and-bailey castle, experiencing what life would have been like for people living in 1066. From wandering through authentic wooden buildings to watching traditional crafts in action, every part of the castle offered something new to discover. Highlights included meeting the roaming animals within the castle grounds, exploring the medieval siege weapons, and climbing the wooden tower for a view of the surrounding countryside. Our students were full of enthusiasm throughout the day, asking thoughtful questions and demonstrating our school values of respect and care. Staff at the castle commented on how respectful and engaged our students were, which reflected very well on our school and wider community. Back at school, the trip has sparked some fantastic follow-up work in both History and Geography lessons, as students make connections between what they've seen and what they've learned in the classroom within our interconnected and dynamic Humanities curriculum. A huge thank you to Mr Bendall, Mrs Nelson, Miss Rafique, Mr Fowlie and Miss Ntaountaki who helped me organise the trip – it was a wonderful day that helped bring History to life for our students.

Faith Reflection: The Name Day of Ismail and the Value of Respect

In our Greek Orthodox tradition, name days hold a special place in our hearts. They are more than mere celebrations; they are moments to honour the saints and figures after whom we are named, reflecting on their virtues and how we can embody them in our daily lives.

On 17 June, we observe the name day of Ismail—a name that resonates across Abrahamic faiths. In the Christian tradition, Ismail (or Ishmael) is recognized as the son of Abraham and Hagar. His story is one of faith, endurance, and the complexities of family dynamics. Despite facing challenges, Ismail's narrative teaches us about God's providence and the importance of trust in divine plans.

The name Ismail means "heard by God," signifying the deep connection and communication between the divine and humanity. This reminds us that every individual's voice matters and that God listens to all, regardless of their circumstances.

This brings us to one of our school's core values: Respect. Respect involves recognising the inherent worth of every person, listening with empathy, and valuing diverse perspectives. End of Season Football Review

An incredible football season has come to an end at St Andrew, filled with memorable highlights and achievements across all year groups. The standout achievement this season came from the combined Year 7, 8, and 9 girls' team, who made history by becoming the 2024/2025 Year 9 Barnet Champions. Displaying exceptional skill, the team scored an impressive 33 goals while only conceding 4 across all competitions. Their determination culminated in a thrilling victory over Archer Academy in the final, securing a 3-1 win. Key players including Eve, who consistently demonstrated remarkable leadership from the centre-back position, and Sofia, whose confidence, and exceptional saves as goalkeeper were pivotal and drove the team to greatness. The achievement not only brought the first girls' team trophy to St Andrew the Apostle but also established them as the best U14s girls' team in Barnet. The triumph reflects the team's outstanding spirit and skill, marking a significant milestone in the school's sporting legacy.





Our Year 7 boys had a remarkable debut season, finishing second in the league and making it to the semi-finals of the borough cup, where they faced an unfortunate exit. Key players Miguel, Captain Fin, and Kamil, the midfield dynamo, showcased immense potential for next season. The Year 8 and 9 boys had their best season yet, reaching the borough final, although they were ultimately overcome by a formidable Ark Academy. This season stood out particularly for Alex, who emerged as the school's top scorer with an impressive tally of 15 goals across Years 9 and 10. Our Year 10 team displayed a mix of strong performances, showing a more unified squad than in previous years.

Despite a disappointing semi-final loss on penalties to Bishop Douglas, whom we had previously defeated in the league, Marko, Kaine, and Luca consistently impressed throughout the season.





The Year 11 boys, known for their remarkable run over the years, had high hopes of finishing on a triumphant note. A highly talented team, they were unlucky in several instances and didn't secure the silverware as hoped. Their memorable victory in the Year 9 borough cup (winning 5-0 against Friern Barnet) in 2023 added to their legacy. They had another chance for glory against Archer Academy in the final, but after a dominant display, the match went to penalties, ending with St Andrew in second place once more. Jayden, Kyros, Jon, Angel, Theo, Petar and Daniel have been excellent contributors over their 5-year journey.

KS3 Exams



Why we do Exams:

The exams are designed to help students consolidate their learning from the academic year, develop effective revision habits, and gain experience in a less pressured environment compared to external exam settings. Additionally, exam results provide teachers with insights into a student's engagement with their studies throughout the year. It's important to note that these exams will not be the sole measure of student progress.



Supporting Your Child:

You can emotionally support your child by discussing their exams with them. Since some students may feel anxious, it's helpful to reassure them that they will receive support and that these exams are not the only measure of their progress. It's okay if they don't perform as expected; experiencing setbacks is an integral part of learning, but what matters more is their response to it. Encourage them to do their best, and if you have concerns, reach out to their form tutor.

You can academically support them by ensuring they know their exam schedule and are revising. Even a little study can make a difference. Teachers will be discussing the exams in class and may offer revision sessions to assist with preparation. For questions on specific subjects, feel free to contact the relevant department directly.



Access Arrangements:

During these exams, students can use their usual working aids (e.g. laptops). GCSE access arrangements are not yet applicable, as testing cannot be conducted until Year 9. However, these exams will provide evidence if access arrangements are necessary for future formal exams. Teachers will support students in these assessments where required. If you have any queries, please contact Mrs Bamber using the staff contact form.





End-of-Year Reports:

At the end of the year, you will receive a comprehensive report for your child. This will include:

- Their achievement level for the year and whether it reflects expected progress.
- Their exam score or grade.
- Indicators of their Attitude to Learning and Homework.




Work Experience with the NHS


