Faith and Fairness: Reflections from Our Orthodox School Community

At St Andrew the Apostle School, our Orthodox Christian faith is at the heart of all we do. It shapes our values, our community, and the way we strive to live together. One of the key values we have been focusing on this term is fairness—a principle deeply rooted in both Scripture and the teachings of the Church.

Fairness, in its truest sense, is about more than just treating people equally. It's about understanding each person's unique needs and showing compassion, balance, and justice in our decisions and actions. In the Orthodox tradition, fairness reflects God's righteousness—His ability to judge with mercy and love. As Proverbs 21:15 reminds us, "When justice is done, it brings joy to the righteous."

In our school community, fairness is not just taught—it's practiced. Whether it's sharing in the classroom, giving everyone a chance to speak, or ensuring all students feel seen and heard, we aim to live this value daily. It also means standing up for others when something is not right. In doing so, we grow in courage, understanding, and unity—just as Christ calls us to do.

Interestingly, fairness is a value respected across many faiths. As part of our religious studies and interfaith work, we sometimes explore how shared values appear in different traditions. A recent class discussion led us to explore the name Ismail, or Ishmael—known in both Christian and Islamic traditions. According to Scripture, Ismail was the son of Abraham and Hagar. Though his path was different from that of Isaac, he was still loved by God and blessed with a great nation. His story is a reminder that God's care is not limited by human divisions. This example helps our students appreciate how fairness also means recognising the dignity of others, even if their journey or beliefs are different. As a Greek Orthodox school, our foundation remains firm in the teachings of the Church, but we also seek to grow in understanding and respect for others.

As we continue through the term, let us all reflect on how we can live more fairly—with our friends, our families, and in our wider community. In the words of the Prophet Micah: "What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8)

May this be our guide, both in faith and in life.

The BBC Young Reporter is now defunct and been replaced by the BBC Academy who will continue to deliver skills-related activities for young people under the new banner BBC Verify on Tour! Supported BBC Academy Live.

On Wednesday 18 June, Apostle News journalists had the opportunity to participate in the first event coming from Sheffield Hallam University and enjoy four 30-minute masterclasses on topics from storytelling through podcasting to talking to some of the team behind the drama Adolescence. All the sessions were broadcast on Microsoft Teams.



09:45–10:20 "Fake Heiress" – Storytelling & Truth in the Age of Podcasts

Join journalist and producer Vicky Baker (BBC's Fake Heiress / Panorama) in conversation with Sile Sibanda to uncover the rise and fall of Anna Delvey — the real story behind the Netflix hit Inventing Anna.

Vicky Baker is a serious BBC news journalist now podcaster. She makes documentaries. The Fake Heiress is a mixture of drama and documentary called docudrama. Vicky's advice for any would be journalist come podcaster is:

"Write creative scripts.... With hard news you chase the facts.... listen to narrative stories on other podcasts ...it's a new exciting field." Go the BBC sounds and hear the incredible story of the Fake Heiress: Fake Heiress - Ep 1. Fake Heiress - BBC Sounds

10:30-11:00 - Session 2: Career Insights - How to Break Into the Media

Hear from BBC Verify, news professionals, and creatives as they share personal career journeys, insider advice, and practical tips for starting out in journalism, production, and digital storytelling.

The main take away from this for anyone wanting to work in news or media is that "ideas are your currency. Have enthusiasm give every job a go.... don't be afraid to try 'stuff'"

To get into the media journalism you need to network, write to writers, email media institutions like the BBC or national newspapers or radio stations. If you get to be an intern, then make yourself useful, make cups of tea, carry plasters. Be ready to help and you won't be forgotten.

A woman camera journalist on the panel told us that the abilities one needed to do her job were: be open-minded, not be judgmental, tell stories. You need energy, drive resilience – because not all the stories are happy ones and you work on little sleep."

13:15–13:45 – Session 3: Power Station – Creativity Meets Climate Action

Explore activism through art with Hilary Powell and Leonie Rousham, directors of the Power Station documentary. A bold, inspiring film about community energy, radical hope, and sustainable futures.

14:00-14:40 - Session 4: Behind-the-Scenes - Adolescence with Warp Films

Peek behind the curtain with the team behind the drama Adolescence. Discover how Sheffield-based Warp Films pulled off an ambitious single-camera drama — from location scouting to set building.




