We also take this opportunity to celebrate our recent GCSE and A-Level results, which have once again reflected the strength of our academic programme. We are proud to report an estimated Progress 8 score of +0.86, which places us well above the national average and shows the excellent progress our students make during their time with us.



GCSE Success at St Andrew the Apostle School!



St Andrew the Apostle School was filled with joy and celebration on Thursday 21 August, as students and staff marked another outstanding year of GCSE results. This year's achievements surpassed even last year's record-breaking performance, with students making remarkable progress—averaging over three-quarters of a grade improvement per subject.

Among the top performers were **Zara**, who secured an incredible *eight grade 9s* and will be studying *Maths*, *History*, *and Psychology* at A Level, and **Gabriel**, who earned *eight grade 8s* and will pursue *Maths*, *History*, *Politics*, *and Biology*. Many students have chosen to continue their academic journey at our Sixth Form, while others are heading into vocational training and apprenticeships.

Mary Karaolis OBE shared her pride in the school community:

"These results are a testament to the hard work of pupils, teachers, and parents. The school is rapidly gathering momentum ahead of our move into superb new buildings in September."

- **English and Maths** results saw a notable rise in the number of students achieving top grades (9–7), both individually and combined.
- **Humanities and Performing Arts** also flourished, reflecting our commitment to a broad and balanced curriculum.

Students and parents alike were thrilled with the results. Teachers and staff are incredibly proud of every student, whose achievements reflect not only academic excellence but also the resilience and work ethic needed for future success.

Parents praised the school's **Christian ethos** and **culture of achievement** as key factors in their children's growth and success.


