Here's what you have to do:

- 1. Choose a book that looks interesting to you. Look at the Summer Reading Challenge resources on the school website for suggested reading material to suit all ages and all interests in addition to the links above.
- 2. Complete the book review/post card attached (attached) in as much detail and colour as possible- remember the best ones will **win a prize**!
- 3. **Remember to bring it** on your first day back to school.

When you have read your book, we would like you to write a postcard to your new English teacher; in this postcard, please answer the following questions:

- 1. What do you think is the main idea that the writer is trying to get across in your chosen book?
- 2. Why do you think this idea is important to the writer? You can begin your postcard with:

Dear English Teacher.

On the front side, you could either draw a picture; insert a photo of the front cover; or take a selfie with your book.

Please send in your completed postcard where we will choose the best 5 and award those students

with a prize. Everybody will also win points for sending back a completed postcard. Here is a template of the writing side of a postcard that you could use, if you like:

This means that over the coming weeks and summer holidays you will read at least four books and complete a detailed book review, which will be judged by the English department when you return to school in September and 3 winners picked who will be given prizes and certificates.

Try and read **as many enjoyable books as you can** over the summer to help you **progress** in school. You may read books that you have at home or have borrowed from the local library.

Here is a model piece of writing to show you what we're looking for. You do not have to set it out like this, but do so if it helps you.
